

How the train station became a museum

Happy Anniversary

45 years ago...... A group of men and women sat around an old wooden table.

The discussion - how to save the historical artifacts, many of which dated back to the settlement of the community, and where to house them.

In 1968, the library had requested the local chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution relocate the museum outside of the building as the youth services department was expanding and the DAR museum space in the lower level was needed.

Some of the members of the Philip Livingston Chapter DAR along with many local ambassadors to history decided to form the Livingston County Historical Society and work towards finding a place to house the historical pieces. The exhibits from the collections were placed in the care of the Society and stored at the "Old Howell Shop" owned by Norman Pettibone until such time as a permanent location was found.

Report of the Museum committee of the Philip Livingston Chapter DAR 2/20/1968

On Monday morning Feb. 19th 1968 four members of the executive board of the Chaper, Mrs. Sydney Clark, Regent, Mrs. Ora Red, Secy, Mrs. J.S> Hage, Trea and Mrs. B.H. Glenn, Librarian, and Ch of the Museum Comm. Met at the Museum room in the Howell Carnegie Library, to pac and arrange for storage of the articles of the museum which the Library Board had asked be removed from the room designated since 1910 as DAR Museum. This packing and dispersal was required on account of proposed remodeling of that part of the building.

Membership drives, fundraisers, auctions, do-


nations and community support raised the \$2,500.00 needed to purchase the 1886 Ann Arbor Railroad Station. The society membership, 400 strong, began the process of restoring the building which had sat idle for many years. Through hard work and dedication, the building, close to becoming a memory of the past, was brought to life and the DAR collection had a new home.

In later years when other historical societies were formed in the county, the focus of the Livingston County Historical Society changed to concentrate on the Howell area, and so in 1991, it became the Howell Area Historical Society.

As the years have passed so have our founding members. The preservation of this historic site falls to us. It is a historical landmark and without membership, stewardship and our diligence, this and other amazing buildings will be a distant memory. As with any other preservation, it takes funding to keep a building in repair, the heat, lights, water turned on, and collections preserved.

Your time and talents as well as your membership are important to sustain this community jewel.

HOWELL-ALWAYS READY TO THROW A PARTY

Long before the Melon Festival, Balloon Fest, Fantasy of Lights, the streets of Howell were closed at the drop of a hat when someone said it was time to party. A four day closure was normal and some would extend clear to the fair grounds (near what today is National Street). It was not uncommon for ads to appear in the paper eight weeks before the event to allow the paper to spread the word far and wide. The ad below ran in the August 15, 1900 edition of the Livingston Republican. Each week the ad grew larger until the final week of the event when the ad stretched to a full page.


