
We must extend a huge thank you to the Boy Scouts for adopting the grounds and gardens. They look wonderful.

135 years Howell Opera

landmark in downtown Howell, Michigan, that serves the
community and surrounding area with

#### 110 years - Howell Carnegie Library -


In 1902, architect E.E. Myers, who was the architect of the Michigan State Capitol Building, was hired to design the building and A. G. Kuehnle of Howell was contracted to construct the building. Through a series of disagreements over costs, the original contractor and architect were fired. In 1904 Carnegie agreed to donate another \$5,000 and more local funds were raised. In 1905 Malcomson and Higginbotham Architects of Detroit and C. A. Sauer & Co., a building contractor from Ann Arbor, were hired to complete the building. The opening ceremony took place on November 19, 1906.

#### ADDED TO OUR COLLECTION



After a long work week, George Sheffield didn't really want to walk home. But it was the 1870s, and trains didn't run on the weekend when he needed to make the 10-mile commute from his job in Three Rivers, Michigan to home in Burr Oak.

So he walked, but as he did he pondered how to make the trip easier.

The answer came in his invention of a

"velocipede" or three-wheeled, hand-powered vehicle made for travel on train tracks. Without the railroad company's knowledge, Sheffield began driving his velocipede between work and home.

One night while driving he discovered a broken roil and elected roilroad efficiels in time to save a train

One night while driving, he discovered a broken rail and alerted railroad officials in time to save a train from derailing. His unique mode of transportation, now known to the officials, piqued their interest and they requested he build several more.

The velocipede proved useful for track inspection and maintenance and in 1879 it was patented by Sheffield. Three years later the Sheffield Velocipede Car Company incorporated and in the early 1900s, Sheffield Car Company ("Velocipede" was dropped in 1892) consolidated with Fairbanks Morse.

#### SPECIAL SUMMER EXHIBITS

Our vice president, Mike Mason is an avid collector of railroad memorabilia. He has shared for display some of his lanterns dating back to the late 1800's through the modern battery/electric powered units.

Other items include a thermos from a Pullman passenger car, security locks and an interesting collection of employee badges including war related from Willow Run bomber plant, Ford Rouge and Highland Park plants and one from the Fairbanks/Morse Company in Three Rivers, MI who built the Velocipede which was just added to our collection. Chauffeur license pins including early pins from 1917 and 1920s are also on display.





#### SPECIAL THANKS TO JUDY BURNS

Twenty-six years ago, Judy Burns began serving on the board of the Howell Area Historical Society. In November of 1992, museum director, John C. Pesek resigned which left the society without a museum director through the winter months.

At the February 1993 meeting, Judy Burns offered to take the open position and has served as museum director for the society until her retirement this year. It is often joked in the volunteer organizations that the person who gets the job is the one who didn't show up at the meeting, but Judy was there and actually did volunteer.

One would think with her love of this community and dedication to its history that Judy was born here. Not so. Missouri natives, she and her husband, Jim, moved initially to Farmington Hills when Jim was transferred to Michigan by GM. With their eyes always open for the perfect place, it wasn't

long before they fell in love with a historic home in Howell. While spending time raising 7 children, she found time to volunteer in the Howell Archives, compile and edit the 1975-2000 supplement to the Howell Bicentennial History book prior to its reprinting, and serve on the production team of the book, "A Walk Through Time - Seven Walking Tours of Howell".

Judy has received many proclamations and awards for her dedication and community involvement.

The society will always be indebted to her for the hard work and diligence to get the Ann Arbor Railroad Depot listed on the State and National Historic Register.
