MILLER LOFTS/ 111-113 NORTH MICHIGAN AVE

THE BUILDING AT 111 N. MICHIGAN AVENUE, NOW,' FINDING ROOTS,' WAS BUILT IN 1897 BY GEORGE BARNES. IT WAS THE HOME OF 'THE LIVINGSTON REPUBLICAN NEWSPAPER,' WHICH HAD BEEN PRINTED SINCE 1855. THE REPUBLICAN WAS ONE OF TWO PREDECESSORS OF THE LIVINGSTON COUNTY DAILY PRESS AND ARGUS. THE OTHER WAS 'THE LIVINGSTON DEMOCRAT,' WHOSE HEADING WAS "CRISP COUNTY NEWS COLLECTED BY CAREFUL CORRESPONDENTS."

AT THAT TIME, NEWSPAPERS WERE FROM 4 TO 8 PAGES LONG, WITH ADS FOR CATARRH, SORE THROAT, CONSUMPTION CURES, BUFFALO ROBES, HORSE BLANKETS, HARNESSES AND SLEIGH BELLS FOR HORSES AND CARRIAGES.

IN 1929, BOTH LIVINGSTON COUNTY NEWSPAPERS WERE COMBINED. THE NEW NAME WAS 'THE LIVINGSTON COUNTY REPUBLICAN – PRESS.' LATER, THE WORD "REPUBLICAN" WAS ELIMINATED FROM THE PAPER. IT, THEN, BECAME THE LIVINGSTON COUNTY PRESS.

IN 1898, MR. BARNES SECURED A LEASE FROM THE UNITED STATES' GOVERNMENT TO PROVIDE THE TOWN OF HOWELL WITH ITS FIRST PERMANENT HOME FOR THE POST OFFICE. THE OFFICE REMAINED IN THIS LOCATION UNTIL 1926, WHEN HARRY WILLIAMS BUILT THE BUILDING AT THE CORNER OF SIBLEY AND SOUTH MICHIGAN. THIS BUILDING STILL STANDS, BUT IS NO LONGER THE POST OFFICE.

ACROSS THE HALL, IN 113 N. MICHIGAN, THERE WAS A TAILOR FROM 1899-1925. IN 1930, GEORGE HORNUNG AND SON, MERCHANT TAILORS, ADVERTISED SHOES FROM \$2.98 – \$4.98 A PAIR, WHILE L.C. ROWLEY UPHOLSTERING SOLD CUSTOM – MADE FURNITURE IN THE SAME SPACE.

AFTER THE POST OFFICE MOVED OUT, BOTH FLOORS WERE THEN USED FOR THE PRINTING OF THE NEWSPAPER. THE "REPUBLICAN, OR LIVINGSTON COUNTY PRESS" WAS PUBLISHED EVERY WEDNESDAY IN THIS BUILDING, UNTIL THE PAPER WAS MOVED TO THE BUILDING ON EAST GRAND RIVER IN 1979. THIS BUILDING CURRENTLY, IS NO LONGER USED FOR THAT PURPOSE. IT NOW HOUSES A PSYCHOLOGICAL PRACTICE.

AN INTERESTING FACT ABOUT THE BUILDING WAS THAT THERE WERE TWO BASEMENTS, UPPER AND LOWER, IN WHICH THE PRINTING PRESSES WERE FORMALLY LOCATED.

WHENEVER WE LOCALS HAVE A CHANCE TO ENTER AN OLD BUILDING, IT IS FASCINATING TO KNOW HOW MANY VARIED OWNERS AND BUSINESSES THERE HAVE BEEN THROUGH THE YEARS.
